Abstract.

As an outstanding African-American author who has got fame for her tragic novel, Toni Morrison is well-known for her depiction of the blacks traumatic experiences at the result of being slaves or the after-affect of African-American's traumatic suffering under white dominance. This black community has to bear the heavy burden of rejection, oppression, racism and white dominance, so they are burdened with a wounded psyche and body that causes pain which constantly reminds them of their gloomy past.
